## The Gift of Time

*This is reprinted from the November 2007 newsletter. I needed to hear it again.  
May it encourage us all. Pastor Zina*

Beloved, we have come to the point in the calendar year when, by human design, we will receive the gift of an extra hour of time. The pessimists among us will say that what we gain on November 5<sup>th</sup> is not an extra hour but the repayment of the hour we lost last spring. However, I prefer to think of the 60 minutes we will acquire as Saturday, November 4<sup>th</sup> turns into Sunday, November 5<sup>th</sup>, in another way. I prefer to think of this time as something precious and rare, available only once each year, something that is easy to take for granted. I prefer to think of this extra hour as a gift of time.

It may sound small, but in reality, this extra hour represents a true present. Think about it this way. Imagine there is a bank which, each morning, credits *your* account with \$8,640.00. This bank will not allow you to keep a cash balance, and at 11:59:59 p.m., removes any remaining funds not used during the previous twenty-four hours.

What would you do if you had such an account? Many of us would rush to use each precious portion of this amazing resource each day. Well, we each have such an account and it is called time. Every morning God credits us with 86,400 seconds and if we had just a dime, per second, well you follow my drift.

So, how might you “spend” this account, this gift of time? I would encourage each of us to invest it so as to get from it the best possible return. What might that mean for you? More time at work, on your body, your soul, your mind—all of the above? More time at work. . . . But let me suggest, no one’s tombstone says, I wish I had spent more time in the office. So, beloved, how *would* you invest your daily windfall of time?

In this moment, as you read this, can you name two things you want to do tomorrow that will make you or your world lighter, better, and more joyful? Yes, that’s it, invest in that. And remember, there is a special gift of time during the first week of November, you and I get an extra 3,600 seconds to spend!

In this month when, as a nation, we focus on thankfulness, may we be thankful for the gift of time.

## Time-Use It or Lose It

Most resources are depleted when used. In contrast, time is depleted when not used. Time is one of the most precious resources we have. Granted, there are many ways to use time. In my generation, we were often told to “take time to smell the roses.” However, many of our life experiences tell us the exact opposite. In school, homework must be done on time. When we join the world of work, blue-collar workers punch a time clock to document when they start and stop, and white-collar workers scramble to get that report done-- on time.

It is not unusual, of course, to complete a report, only to have it sit for weeks or months before any real action results. I still see this in my part-time contract work supporting a public safety association. A federal agency will release a proposed regulation, and seek comments in 30 days. Everyone rushes to understand the potential impact, and develop support, opposition, or recommended changes. Then, three or more years later, you might see a decision. It certainly makes one wonder why there was such a rush to provide the input in such a compressed amount of time.

Constant connectivity through cellphones, email, text messages, etc., is a blessing and a curse from a time perspective. These conveniences allow us to get more done in the time we have, and to receive important information immediately, but can mean we are never “off the clock.” Of course, each of these conveniences has an off switch, if we choose to use it.



There are life-changing events that can alter our perspective on time. For example, raising children into responsible adults underscores the value of spending time with them-- a gift much more important than one attainable online or from a store. Many of us reach the milestone of having adult children wishing we could have had more time, or at least prioritized more time, with them as they were growing up. The time cannot be recovered, but fortunately, love and forgiveness helps compensate for time “lost.”

Another life-changing event that alters our perspective is retirement. An approach that comes to mind is “what I don’t do today, I can do tomorrow.” Rick Bragg penned an article in *Southern Living Magazine* entitled “The Fine Art of Piddling” in which he writes:

What is a piddler? It is hard to explain to begin with, because piddling is neither one thing or another, but something in between. It is not rest, not something that can be done with your feet on an ottoman or as you recline in a Posturepedic. But then neither is it work, something that one toils at, sweats at, something one needs a break from, for lunch, coffee. It is certainly not something for which one should ever be paid, and absolutely not something that one does while watching a clock.

Growing up in a rural area in the 1950’s/1960’s, I think people dedicated more time to piddling. Given the benefit of stopping to notice the beauty around us that God provides, I can identify with Rick Bragg’s article. Let us all strike the proper balance of working, attending to family, and piddling, and give thanks to God that we have the freedom to prioritize our time. After all, God is the only one who knows how much time we really have.

*Ain't God good, folks?*





## **Winter's Coming: A Note From the Properties Committee**


As we continue to celebrate the wonderful fall season, it won't be long before we'll be spotting the first snowflakes of winter.

## THANKS...GIVING... or THANKSGIVING... *Dr. Samira El-Yasir*

‘THANKSGIVING’, two words that, joined together, create a national celebration in the United States which represents a wonderful, beautiful holiday. It is a day filled with good food, good spirits, and with many noble messages and thoughts expressed. It is not an annual holiday that affixes itself to any religion; however, it can have, for many, deep religious and spiritual meanings. Thanksgiving is the United States at its very best, or, at least, that is my opinion. As with all things, over time the true meanings of holidays can become increasingly commercial, and thereby lose their initial spirit and intent. And so, we must guard our Thanks...Giving...

So, what does that mean? Is it for you just an extra day off, the turkey or ham, the pumpkin, mincemeat or pecan pie? Or is there a deeper meaning we should contemplate this year.

As I thought about Thanksgiving, one of my aunts, who was a linguist, came to the forefront of my mind. Her primary job was to work with tribal villages in Mexico, and take the unique “whistled” speech sounds used by these villagers, the Chinantec, and create the corresponding written words. As they worked, they had to take into account not only what they heard, but also the customs and the culture as they translated the words onto paper. They had to be careful to ensure that the definitions or details they wrote were accurate, and did not offend those they were translating for.

When I take the two words of Thanksgiving and translate them to the Arabic this is what I find. ‘Thanks’ in Arabic is ‘*shukr*’. It translates to mean reward and appreciation. It’s an important word in Arabic because it’s a quality found in believers and it is a source of all goodness. In the Quran, it is also used at times to denote faith. I was taught that we are to not only show gratitude and thank God always, but we are to thank our parents, our spouses, our friends, neighbors and all that do us good. ‘Giving’ in Arabic is ‘*iieta*’ and brings to my mind one of the pillars of Islam. It’s the pillar that speaks on Charity and Giving. Each day we remind ourselves to give to others, and be filled with gratitude as all we have or receive really belongs to God. Everything!

I learned, and believe, that God promises all that we need will be provided, and so we are to train ourselves to give in times of both ease and of hardship. Our souls should trigger genuine concern for the well-being of others. Priority is given to feeding the poor and helping those God puts in our path. The personal sacrifice of giving one’s possessions, no matter how small, for the sake of helping those in need, purifies our souls, and gives an example to others as to how they should give and live. From a drop of water on a dry garden to all things material in our lives, we must remember that everything is here for just a brief period of time. And everything is to be shared. The Quran emphasizes feeding the hungry, clothing the naked, helping those who are in need. We take care of others and God cares for us. The Bible also says that if He cares for the sparrows, how much must He love us and will care for us.

As you plan your Thanks...Giving...this year, it does not matter where you are from or what religion you practice or language you speak. What matters is how you will be grateful and thankful for each day and each blessing, even on the toughest days. As you celebrate Thanks...Giving in your life, how will you give today? Who will you thank with an authentic heart? As you celebrate your Thanksgiving this year and as it rolls into Christmas, I wish you a time of self-reflection and thankfulness, and may your hearts be full of genuine charity and gratitude. Thankful and giving with you this season.
