MARCH IS WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH



Women in the United States have been fighting for equality in work, wages, voting rights, and dignity since 1908. Now, over 100 years later, we celebrate March as Women's Month. The thirty-one days of the month are filled with observances, celebrating outstanding women across the ages. A recent book (also a traveling art show and a PBS special) entitled *Women Hold Up Half the Sky*, noted the stories of famous and unfamiliar women who, as the title says, hold up half the sky. From Clara Barton, who founded the Red Cross, to Susan B. Anthony, who forged the path for the women's vote; from Fannie Lou Hamer, who was a civil rights icon, to Harriet Tubman, who declared, *Ain't I a Woman*; from Malala Yousafzai, who would not be denied her education, to Wangari Maathai who educated the world, beginning in Kenya, to the importance of environmental science . . . the world is richer and far more beautiful because these brilliant resilient and wise mothers, daughters, nieces, aunts, grandmothers, godmothers and sister-friends have lived, loved, and help shape the world. In ways large or small, known or unknown, women do, indeed, hold up half the sky.

However, the acceptance of women, heralded by this month of remembrance, in all fields of endeavors is not uniformly received. Recently, a colleague sent me an article in which John Piper, a theologian and pastor, noted **women should not be seminary professors**. Piper reasons that seminaries, properly understood, should educate **men** to fill the pastorate. Because there is no sound theological reason women should train pastors (or so he says), women should neither be allowed to train seminarians or certainly to attend seminary. While this article made me angry, in large part the emotion that remains with me is sadness. I am saddened to think of all of the men who will attend the seminaries Dr. Piper supports without the gift of *half the sky*. These brothers will come of age, as pastors, without the wisdom, experience and practical insight of one half of the human race.

But the article also emboldens me. It makes me want to make every place I stand in, gender diverse. It makes me want to bring the voices of brothers and sisters together for the common good, and for making better and broader the common good. So, in this Women's History month, I say Dr. Piper, thank you. You remind me our work is not finished. Your words inspire me to recommit to being sure the voices of women and men mingle in study, in prayer, in disagreement, in hope, and in the fight for justice. Your stance makes me know I must take and hold my position, with God's help and God's permission. And if I am able to do so, then, Rev. Piper, men and women will, together, hold up the entire sky. May it be and may we be here to see and celebrate.

OUR CIRCUIT BOARD

Recently, our flat screen LED TV stopped working. One night, it worked fine and the following night it would not turn on at all. I replaced the batteries in the remote, and that has absolutely no effect on the TV. The four-year-old 55-inch screen is dark and exhibits no sound, i.e., nothing to show there is life in the TV at all. Still, it was a gift from our children, and I am reluctant to simply discard the TV in the electronics recycling bin.

Like most modern electronics devices, there is no fuse externally accessible on our TV. That would be too simple! Our son helped me move the TV to the dining room table, where we could lay it down flat, remove the back cover and try to diagnose the problem. Upon removing the back cover, we were astonished to see that other than the 55-inch LED screen which covers over 1300 square inches of space, the “innards” of the TV, are primarily two small circuit boards that together take up only about 5% of the space covered by the screen. The power supply board provides the right voltages to the other TV components. The second board, dubbed the main circuit board, controls practically all the functions of the TV—tuning the desired channel, providing the sound, etc. The two circuit boards are connected with a cable that has 14 different wires, and each circuit board is packed with many miniscule components. All must work properly for the TV to function.



My engineering reasoning said there must be an internal fuse gone, or some malfunction in the part of the TV that supplies power to the other parts, since there is no sign of life. The internal fuse tested all okay. The power supply board has a diagram that shows the correct voltage for each of the 14 pins where the cable to the other board connects. Once magnified, so it is actually readable, the diagram is a big help in making the diagnosis. Taking a few measurements shows that all the voltages coming out of the power supply board are correct. Another “ah-ha” moment was revealed as the LED screen lit up if the cable to the main circuit board was disconnected from the power supply board. In other words, something in the main circuit board seems to be malfunctioning. I have ordered a replacement main circuit board, scheduled to arrive soon, and hopefully that will resolve the problem.

You may wonder why I am relaying this story, for which Pastor Zina likely would comment, “There goes the engineer again.” In my view, we have some parallels to the TV. To work properly, each of our organs, like each component on the TV circuit boards, must work properly. Our heart, comparable to the TV power-supply board, helps supply power, i.e., blood, to all the other organs. Our brain, the “main circuit board,” controls all our functions. Like the two boards in the TV, the heart and brain must be connected and work well together. If one malfunctions, it can affect the other, and that can extend beyond the physical being, to include our mindset and behavior.

Fortunately, God tolerates our periodic missteps and does not discard us into the recycle pile. Still, I wonder if the engineer in God sometimes wishes He could simply install a new circuit board in us, so that we would function better in His eyes.



THE MANY STREAMS OF COMMUNITY CHURCH OF BARRINGTON'S INCOME

Recently, a very good question was raised regarding the different streams that comprise Community Church's income. Thanks to Peer Lykke for the question. Let's see if the following explanation helps clear things up.

Each year in October, during the Stewardship Campaign, members and friends of Community Church are invited to pray and share the amount of money they believe they will be able to contribute to the church in the coming year. We call this amount a pledge.

The pledge information is used to build the church's budget for the upcoming year. Added to the pledged amount are other sources of income, including non-pledge income (those funds placed into the offering trays as loose change), rental income, special gifts and targeted income. Targeted income includes funds contributed to:

- Deacon's Fund
- Flower Fund
- Youth Mission Trip
- Love His House

It is important to note that funds contributed through a targeted income stream are not counted against one's pledge. All funds contributed through the targeted income streams will be noted as contributions above and beyond a member's pledged amount.

It has come to the Council's attention via Peer's excellent question that this distinction between pledged amounts and amounts given to targeted projects has not, heretofore, been made clear.

It is also important to note that any funds given to Community Church are, for income tax purposes, deductible. The distinction of whether funds are contributed as a portion of your pledge or for a targeted reason is immaterial to the taxing authorities. And, your quarterly statements will report all funds received in envelopes, regardless of their category.

In order to be sure your funds are recorded and designated in the way you choose them to be designated, please be sure to use your giving envelopes or note it on your personal check. We appreciate your questions, and look forward to being certain that all members and friends are well informed.

Dear Friends,

As has been reported in these pages earlier, I applied for and was awarded a sabbatical grant by the Louisville Institute. The grant enables me to pursue a question of interest. First, a few details about timing, and then a few about the topic of my study.

TIMING

My contract with Community Church encourages me to take a sabbatical approximately every seven years. On February 18th, I observed my 11th anniversary as your pastor, and, by my choice, I have not taken a sabbatical. However, now is the time. My sabbatical grant begins March 1, 2018 and must be completed by June, 2019. Most pastoral sabbaticals are 12 weeks. It is my desire to take up to 8 weeks of sabbatical in 2018, and 4 weeks in 2019. The exact dates are not yet finalized, as they must be based on the specific churches I will visit. It is my intention to take the first 8 weeks of the sabbatical in the summer and mid-fall months of 2018, and the final four weeks in January or February of 2019. The first 8 weeks (in 2018), are in order to conduct the research, and the four weeks in 2019 will be utilized to write-up the findings of my research.

PASTORAL COVERAGE

During my absence, I am working with appropriate parties to secure pastoral coverage. This person will preach on Sundays, conduct pastoral care visits and spend at least one day per week in the office. He or she will also consult with the Council and other leadership duties as they arise.

RESEARCH TOPIC

We are a nation divided into a plethora of silos. Politics, economics, ideology, and radio station preferences not only separate us, they can cause us to label one another not only as different, but deviant. No longer do we stop with statements such as, "I disagree with you". Now, with alacrity we rush to "I must demean you."

However, in my 11 years at CCB, I have not experienced the need to demean, even when we do disagree. I am curious, does the fact that I am of a race different from most members affect our ability to both see one another and hear one another, with respect? Are there other churches like this? If there are, what might the world learn from us? I am so very curious.

And so, I am off to find a series of churches who are shaped as we are; pastor of color, congregation largely Euro-American, to see what I can learn. Pray for me, and I will keep you up-to-date as the plans evolve.
