Update on Pastor Zina's Sabbatical

sab-bat-i-cal

a period of paid leave granted to a university teacher or other worker for study or travel. Closely linked with sabbath.

Many of you have asked about the plans for my sabbatical. I appreciate your interest and am glad to share the progress I have made. First, many thanks to the Louisville Institute for granting \$15,000 for my 12-week sabbatical. The money will be used to cover my travel, consultants to my project, transcription of interviews, and the replacement costs (housing and stipend) for an interim minister.

Though initially I had hoped to take 8 weeks off during the summer of 2018, and 4 weeks in February of 2019, plans have changed. I will be interviewing pastors of churches, like ours, where the race of the pastor and the race of the overall congregation are different. Summer interviews have been difficult to schedule and I have been advised to visit churches and conduct my interviews beginning mid-September through mid-November. I am working with leaders in the American Baptist Churches USA and the United Church of Christ's national office to select 6-7 churches who describe themselves as stable and healthy, and meet the criteria described above. I will visit each church, spending up to four days with them, observing their life, attending worship and talking with leadership and laity.

Much of the literature about cross racial assignment of pastors focuses on what **does not work**. My research intends to focus on those churches who meet my criteria, and who find themselves moving forward in a positive manner. It is my sense that this research will enlarge and enhance the understanding of cross racial assignment of pastors by attempting to understand the settings where the relationships have worked.

There is much reading for me to do before the interviews begin, and also consultations with others in this field. However, I am most excited and already have two agencies interested in publishing my results.

I have begun to work with leaders within the American Baptist Churches ABC and USA to find and recommend someone to serve Community Church for the eight weeks I will be away this fall, and the four weeks that will find me writing up the results of my research in the early months of 2019.

I am confident God will guide us to the right person to walk with CCB during my time away, and I pray that I will return from both the eight weeks away this fall and the four weeks away next year, refreshed, deepened and raring to come back to the church on the corner of Lincoln and Grove, a church that I love.

Reconstruction

Practically all of us have lived through, or possibly even embraced, some type of reconstruction. Reconstruction occurs on our roads, in our homes, within our lives and in our church. The process of adding lanes to Interstate 90 is something many of us “lived through” but the end result of fewer delays in our travel is certainly something we “embrace.” Did you ever stop to think about the skill of the numerous planners and workers that it took to complete that project? When we do that, I think it is easier to embrace the reconstruction, even while it is in process.

Recently, Brenda and I have had reconstruction going on in our laundry room and in an upstairs bathroom. For the laundry room we had some new cabinets built and some new doors made for a few of the existing cabinets. Chris, a friend of our son, built the new cabinets and doors at a small fraction of the cost we were quoted from one of the big box retailers. It was great to see Chris’ skill put into action and how much pride he took in his work. Fred and Pat, two men who have made improvements to our home many times before over the years, did the bulk of the remaining work from completing the demo to installing new tile to applying the final coat of paint. Fred and Pat both exhibit great skill, hard work, diligence, and an ability to figure out a solution for any unexpected problems that arise. I admire people like Chris, Fred and Pat who work with their hands, minds, hearts and the tools available to make something better.



Unfortunately, the same tools all too often can be used to inflict pain and death. While the modern designs are undoubtedly a bit different than tools in Jesus’ time, the same basic hammer used in reconstruction today was used to nail his hands and feet to the cross. Hammers and other tools of course can also be used to inflict pain today, when in the hands of someone who has not been raised to revere human life. So, in essence, it is not the tool that causes the problem; it is how someone chooses to use the tool—either for good or for evil. Although it is difficult to listen to today’s news, we need to remember there are still many examples of good in the world as well.

We are fortunate at CCB that we have the opportunity for some positive “reconstruction.” That is, we have new members who can bring fresh ideas, willing hearts and hands, and their own excitement to help build our CCB teachings and work. The adult Sunday school class is just one example of how both new and longstanding members contribute together to the discussion and success at CCB.

As we embrace this Easter season, it is an opportune time to decide how we each want to participate in some positive “reconstruction” -- whether in ourselves, our homes, our church and/or, our community. How do we each put to use the skills God has provided? Also, when we choose to focus on the God-given skills and talents involved, I think it allows us to embrace the entire process, not just the end result.

Q: What happens if Rev. Thompson finds a job in a church or not-for-profit organization at the conclusion of her residency at Elk Grove Hospital?

However, if she obtains employment in a place that does not require her presence on Sunday, we will continue to be graced with her presence and gifts.

Q: Will Rev. Thompson preach again at CCB?

A: Yes, in fact, Pastor Zina plans to seek opportunities to invite all of her ordained colleagues to preach throughout the year.

Because of the grace and kindness of the Mission and Outreach Ministry and the Cookie Walk Women, we have raised 87.5% of the funds we need to join St. Michael's Barrington (Episcopal) in sponsoring a refugee family, under the auspices of Refugee One (refugeeone.org). Once we are assigned our family, our joyful task will be to walk with them for six months. Why just six months? Refugee One has discovered that six months is the best time frame for helping a family settle into their new lives in America without creating an unhealthy dependence.

Here is what is next for Community Church and St. Marks

VOLUNTEERS

We need a few more volunteers. Volunteers will travel to Chicago to visit our family. The family will live in the neighborhood of Refugee One (47th and Broadway, Chicago) and we will create four teams of visitors, with 3 – 5 people per team. The teams will each have one week a month to visit. The visits will include a chance to get to know the family, help them to negotiate their new home and to simply be a voice of welcome and clarity for the family. If you are interested in volunteering, please let Pastor Zina know. Training will be provided and a background check will be necessary.

Refugee One does not know when we will be assigned a family. They place families as the State Department alerts them to a family's arrival. Our best estimate of when we will be assigned a family is in mid-April.


EASTER BRUNCH
