Moderator's Update



I may be wrong, but February can be a confusing month. We're surrounded by hearts and flowers, but as Lent begins just after Valentine's Day, we also are told to strengthen our faith, put aside all the unnecessary "romance" and become more mindful as those who faithfully follow God.

The Missions Committee met on January 10, 2023. Those present: Christy Davis, James Majzan, Jackie Phinney, Carolyn Roussel, Glee Huddlestun, (via phone) Lauren Davis; absent – Sandy Schroeder and Pastor Chris Shade

Fresh produce collection for December was switched to the third Sunday due to Christmas, and the larger than usual produce donation from CCB was greatly appreciated by the Pantry.

CCB's participation in Barrington's Winter Giving Day Campaign (boot drive, etc.) was updated. Glee emphasized the huge amount of donations received (coats, boots, caps, toys, bicycles, board games, soft items/blankets, diapers, etc.) and the scope of the setup at Barrington Middle School - Station campus, as well as an explanation of the procedures for the (invitation) shoppers.

The Committee reviewed the responsibilities of Missions for the Assistance Fund (f/k/a Deacon's Fund). The balance in the Fund as of December 31, 2022, is **\$5,947.47**. A discussion was had on the chain of contact concerning a request for assistance and, specifically, as it relates to a member of the CCB congregation who is in need. It was agreed that such a request for financial assistance from a congregant could be made to a member of Missions, who in turn would contact Pastor Chris on behalf of the congregant to explain the request, or the request could be made to Pastor Chris directly by the congregant. Either way, Pastor Chris would be in contact directly with the congregant to obtain the particulars of the need and secure addresses of the payees, as well as to get the approval of the Missions Committee, if the request would be over \$200.

It was also suggested that the congregation be made regularly aware of the Assistance Fund and its purpose in order to encourage contributions to the Fund. It was suggested that Pastor Chris orally remind the congregation on the first Sunday of the Assistance Fund and its purpose (envelopes in the pews); a written appeal would also be included in the first Sunday bulletin; and a reminder will be noted in Glee's Missions Newsletter article. (We all remember Bunny Janke's passionate plea for Deacon's Fund contributions each first Sunday.)

Fourth-quarter 2022 benevolence funds in the total amount of **\$----3,195.94** were available for distribution, of which **\$3,100** was disbursed to the following charities:

Total fourth-quarter 2022 distribution (5):

Bright Hope is a Christian-based charity which has been assisting local churches in six countries around the world for over 45 years. The people in these areas face extreme poverty and the organization offers HOPE for today, HOPE for tomorrow and HOPE for eternity. Services include medical care, care for orphans and vulnerable children, clean water, job training, education, agricultural practices, animal rearing, and church leadership development with evangelism and discipleship support. Liz Camp (David Phinney's daughter) has served on missions to Uganda several times and has been our direct contact for the organization.



Midwest Shelter for Homeless Veterans (MSHV)(based in Wheaton) provides housing, supportive services and community outreach to help homeless and at-risk veterans and their families achieve self-sufficiency. Founded in 2007, MSHV operates on a vision of no veteran left behind due to homelessness, joblessness, poverty and/or mental health issues.

The Night Ministry is a Chicago-based charity whose mission is to provide *human connection, housing support* and *healthcare* to members of our community who are unhoused or experiencing poverty. The organization also provides food distribution through its Health Outreach Bus. CCB has supported The Night Ministry in the past.
