There comes a point in every great rock and roll biopic, typically during an interview, where the musician comes to the realization that they've lost their way. The interviewer will ask, "What's it like to be rich and famous and adored by millions of fans?" The rock star will have a sudden moment of clarity. "It's funny," they'll respond, "When we started out, the goal was never fame. It was never about the money or the partying or the drugs. It was about the

music. The goal was always supposed to be about the music."

We started our Lenten season focusing on "God's Gifts of Imperfection" led by Brené Brown's book of a similar title. But imperfection was never the goal. Oh sure! We were taught to embrace imperfection, and this led to many lessons such as:

- It takes courage to be vulnerable, to be honest about ourselves, and to tell our story. It takes tremendous courage to accept our uniqueness, especially if it is "flawed" in the eyes of others.
- Self-worth, the potential for creativity, and God-given talents are all innate within us. We cannot do anything to earn them, but we can develop them.
- Guilt must be separated from shame. Joy must be sought out. Hope must be cultivated.
- This is incredibly hard work. So, we must rest as God rested and pray as Jesus prayed.
